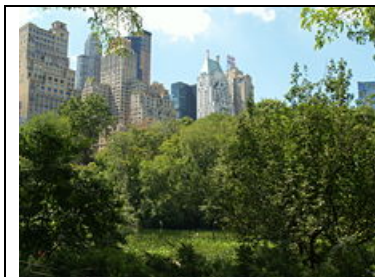




New York City Neighborhoods

Create your own New York City tour. Select the neighborhoods you want to explore and let our licensed, local NYC guides show you around!



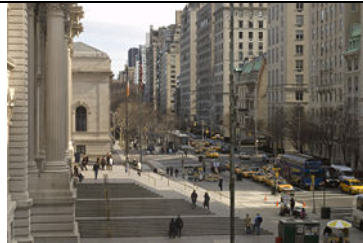
Central Park: New Yorker's backyard. Highlights include Bethesda Fountain, Bow Bridge, Bethesda Fountain and many hidden treasures.



Harlem: Beautiful architecture, amazing history and a vibrant community make this area a must visit.



Rockefeller Center: Home to NBC Studios, the Christmas Tree, ice-skating rink & St. Patrick's Cathedral. Great sculptures.



Upper East Side: New York's Gold Coast. Home to Museum Mile and Gilded Age New York society with old mansions & private clubs.



Times Square, Theatre District & Hell's Kitchen: The Crossroads of the World, Broadway theater their interesting little neighbor.



East 42nd Street: Here we have the Chrysler Building, Grand Central Terminal and the United Nations along with other impressive buildings.



Chelsea: Home to many of the City's popular galleries. Also worth a visit here is the General Theological Seminary.



Meatpacking District: By day an active meatpacking district, by night one of the City's hottest neighborhoods with great restaurants, clubs, boutiques and lounges.



Greenwich Village: Filled with crooked, narrow, tree-lined streets and charming townhouses and back alleys this picturesque village should be tops on your list.



East Village: An edgy, diverse neighborhood with great history and an artistic vibe.



SoHo: A former manufacturing warehouse district turned into a vibrant artistic community in the 1970's and now a veritable shopper's paradise with some excellent galleries as well.



Chinatown & Little Italy: These two neighborhoods right next to each area are exciting places to explore with great food and lots of hidden nooks and crannies.



Gramercy Park: Home to Manhattan's only private park and lined with beautiful Victorian townhouses and private clubs.



Madison Square & Union Square: Two vibrant neighborhoods with a lot to offer with beautiful buildings and restaurants. Where many of New York's riots and protests have taken place.



Lower East Side: Once known as New York's melting pot & home to millions of immigrants. Now one of NYC's hottest neighborhoods. Filled with great little boutiques, galleries, bars and restaurants.



Wall Street / Financial District: The oldest and most historic part of NYC. This is also where you can see the Statue of Liberty. Discover some history you never knew.



Brooklyn Heights: NYC's first designated historic district and America's first suburb. Peaceful, quiet, right on the water with amazing views of Manhattan and great local history.



D.U.M.B.O.: What was once a gritty manufacturing and warehouse district on the waterfront has been transferred into a vibrant and pricey artistic neighborhood.



Red Hook: A unique and overlooked quirky little waterfront neighborhood overlooking Manhattan and the Statue of Liberty.
